SEC'S RESPONSE TO THE COMMISSION'S INITIAL ORDER ON REMAND

The New Mexico Public Regulation Commission's ("Commission") Initial Order on Remand places The Socorro Electric Cooperative, Inc. ("SEC") in the unenviable position of having to explain why the Final Order and Compliance Order in this matter are not aligned with the law to virtually the same Commissioners who entered those Orders and invites SEC to share discussions with the Commission's counsel that SEC believes are confidential settlement communications. Nevertheless, SEC responds to the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission ("Commission") Initial Order on Remand as follows:

At the outset, SEC notes that the Commission's Findings at paragraph 2 incorrectly states that SEC's proposed revenue increase would boost its OTIER to 2.84. SEC's proposed OTIER was 1.84.

1) Do you support or oppose the Final Order and state reasons?

Response: SEC opposed the Final Order because it exceeded the Commission's authority pursuant to 17.9.540.6 NMAC, contained internal inconsistencies that were irreconcilable that the Commission refused to address when requested, substituted the Commission's own judgment for the judgment of SEC's trustees in a manner contrary to law, required SEC to implement rates that it did not propose in Advice Notices 69-71 and was not based on substantial evidence in the record. SEC thus exercised its rights and filed its appeal, Case No. S-1-SC-37948, and refers the

Commission to its Statement of the Issues for Appeal and Brief in Chief for a detailed explanation of SEC's reasons for opposing the Final Order.

2) Do you support or oppose the compliance Order, and state reasons?

Response: SEC opposed the Compliance Order because, among other reasons, the Commission exceeded its jurisdiction and summarily imposed fines against SEC's Trustees individually without due process of law. The Trustees were not named parties in SEC's application. The Commission failed to hold any hearing and took no evidence regarding whether any Trustee violated his or her fiduciary or statutory duties to SEC or its members. Because the Compliance Order was unlawful, SEC filed its emergency petition for a writ of mandamus, Case No. S-1-SC-38302. SEC refers the Commission to its Statement of the Issues for Appeal on the Compliance Order and its Emergency Verified Petition for Writ of Mandamus and Request for Stay for a detailed explanation of its reasons for opposing the Compliance Order.

Is SEC intending to comply with the Final Order, and if so, when, and if not, 3) why not?

Response: SEC exercised its right to appeal the Commission's Final Order and, pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 62-11-1 (1993), filed a Motion to Stay. SEC is awaiting the New Mexico Supreme Court's decision and will fully comply with any decision from that Court.

Are your positions identical to that stated in your Briefs filed in S-1-SC 38302 4) and S-1-SC 37948 and if not, what position is changed and in what manner?

Response: Yes.

5) What rates have been charged by SEC and/or paid by Tech and the City since

the date of the Final Order?

Response: SEC is maintaining the status quo by charging the rates that were in effect prior to filing Advice Notices 69-71. No rates have been changed pending the outcome of the appeal to the New Mexico Supreme Court.

6) Is SEC currently in compliance with the Final Order; and if not, reasons?

Response: No, as stated above, SEC is awaiting the decision of the New Mexico Supreme Court that SEC believes is holding the Final Order in obeyance.

7) Should the Compliance Order be revised and/or withdrawn?

<u>Response</u>: Yes, the Compliance Order should be withdrawn for the reasons stated in SEC's emergency petition for a writ of mandamus filed in Case No. S-1-SC-38302.

6) [sic] What revisions should be made to the Compliance Order?

Response: The Compliance Order should be withdrawn in its entirety.

8) Have the parties been in negotiations since the Compliance Order?

Response: No. SEC previously agreed to mediation to resolve both cases pending before the New Mexico Supreme Court but was informed that New Mexico Tech and the City of Socorro declined to participate in any mediation. SEC will agree to participate in any mediation that could result in a global resolution of all pending matters.

9) If so, what areas of agreement and/or disagreement remain amongst the parties?

Response: Not applicable.

10) What proposed resolution of the matter is desired to be able to file a stipulated joint motion of dismissal of all New Mexico Supreme Court appeals?

Response: SEC requests that the Commission rescind the Final Order and Compliance Order and permit SEC to implement the rates, rules and forms in Advice Notices 69-71, which were supported by its extensive Cost of Service Study performed by C. H. Guernsey & Company, Engineers • Architects • Consultants. While many members protested the Advice Notices, none of the notices filed articulated a reason for denying the requested rates.

11) SEC shall submit its audited financial statements for 2019, 2020 and 2021.

Response: Attached are copies of the audited financial statements for 2019 and 2020. SEC has not yet completed the 2021 audit.

SEC notes that it has been forced to take multiple actions to contain expenses, many of which are at the expense of SEC employees in the form of no or limited wage increases. As detailed in the Affidavit of Joseph M. Herrera filed contemporaneously herewith, SEC has limited staff training that is offered to conserve resources. SEC has deferred maintenance and has not hired contractors to keep current with tree trimming and pole replacements. SEC elected not to fill a staking engineer position and has decreased the number of meter readers from three to two positions. SEC borrowed \$8 million to infuse its cash on hand. It has delayed purchasing new or late model used vehicles for its aging fleet. SEC's bucket trucks are over nine years old and SEC has cannibalized one bucket truck to make repairs to the remaining two bucket trucks. SEC's pressure digger is a 1997 model. SEC current headquarters building was constructed in 1953 and has significant issues because of its age. SEC has delayed indefinitely the construction of a new office headquarters building because of its current financial position.

SEC has also been unable to replace or update its phone system. The current system is outdated and has had issues with the server going down, which prevents members from being able to contact SEC by phone. SEC has been unable to replace or update its outdated servers, which are no longer supported due to the age of the system.



Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Socorro Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the Cooperative), which comprise the balance sheets as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the related statements of income, comprehensive income and patronage capital, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Socorro Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the Cooperative) is a non-profit company organized to provide electric service at the retail level to primarily residential and commercial accounts in a designated service area composed of the counties surrounding the City of Socorro, New Mexico. Power delivered at retail is purchased wholesale from Tri-State Electric Generation and Transmission Association, Inc. Any revenues earned in excess of costs incurred are allocated to members of the Cooperative and are reflected as patronage capital equity in the balance sheet.

System of Accounts

The accounting records of the Cooperative are maintained in accordance with the Rural Utilities Service (RUS) Uniform System of Accounts (USOA) prescribed for RUS electric borrowers.

Electric Plant, Maintenance, and Depreciation

Electric plant is stated at the original cost of construction, which includes the cost of contracted services, direct labor, materials, and overhead items. Contributions from others toward the construction of electric plant are credited to the applicable plant accounts.

When property which represents a retirement unit is replaced or removed, the average cost of such property as determined from the continuing property records is credited to electric plant and such cost, together with cost of removal less salvage, is charged to accumulated provision for depreciation.

Maintenance and repairs, including the renewal of minor items of plant not comprising a retirement unit, are charged to the appropriate maintenance accounts, except that repairs of transportation and service equipment are charged to clearing accounts and redistributed to operating expense and other accounts.

Accounts Receivable

In the normal course of business, the Cooperative recognizes accounts receivable for energy delivered and billed. The Cooperative allows 20 days from the date of the bill for payment to be received or the service is considered delinquent. Delinquent accounts receive a penalty of .0667%. If no payment is received within 24 days the account is subject to disconnect.

The Cooperative provides an allowance for doubtful accounts to recognize the portion of receivables considered uncollectible. The Cooperative accrues for this allowance, as needed, in order to keep the allowance above the total amounts owed in excess of 90 days per the accounts receivable aging report. The Board of Trustees reviews delinquent accounts annually and charges off accounts over five years old.

Inventories

Materials and supplies inventories are valued at average unit cost.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are represented by cashgeneral and cash-restricted.

Cash - Restricted

The Cooperative holds cash that is restricted for scholarships.

Electric Revenues from Contracts with Customers

The Cooperative's operating revenues are under the jurisdiction of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission.

Substantially all operating revenues and customer accounts receivables are derived from contracts with customers. Performance obligations related to the sale of energy are satisfied as energy is delivered to customers. The Cooperative recognizes revenue that corresponds to the price of the energy delivered to the customer. The measurement of energy sales to customers is generally based on the reading of their meters, which occurs on a systematic basis throughout the month. At the end of each month, amounts of energy delivered to customers since the date of the last meter reading are estimated, and the corresponding unbilled revenue is recognized. The Cooperative has calculated that its unbilled revenue for delivered power usage which has not been billed to customers at December 31, 2019 and 2018 amounted to \$530,217 and \$569,727, respectively.

The Cooperative does not recognize a separate financing component of its collections from customers as contract terms are short-term in nature. The Cooperative presents its revenues net of any excise or sales taxes or fees.

The Cooperative's tariffs for electric service include a power cost recovery factor and a debt cost adjustment factor. These factors provide for the adjustment of electric rates charged to customers to reflect the changes in the cost of power and in interest costs, from the costs which were established in the test year of the Cooperative's last rate case. In order to match power costs and interest costs and related revenues, costs to be billed in subsequent periods are recognized as accrued under-collected power cost and debt cost adjustments, and amounts to be refunded to customers in subsequent periods are recognized as over-collected power cost and debt cost adjustments.

Income Tax Status

The Cooperative is an exempt organization for federal income tax purposes under Section 501(c)(12) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Cooperative has adopted the "uncertain tax positions" provisions of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The primary tax position of the Cooperative is its filing status as a tax exempt entity. The Cooperative determined that it is more likely than not that its tax positions will be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and that all tax benefits are likely to be realized upon settlement with taxing authorities.

The Cooperative files its income tax return in the U.S. federal jurisdiction. The Cooperative is no longer subject to U.S. federal tax examinations by federal taxing authorities for years before 2016.

The Cooperative recognizes interest accrued related to income tax activities in interest expense and penalties in operating expenses. There were no penalties or interest recognized during the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018.

Patronage Capital Certificates

Patronage capital from associated companies is recorded at the stated amount of the certificates. At the end of each year the Cooperative receives an estimated allocation from its G&T purchased power provider. In accordance with USOA, the Cooperative records this estimated amount as income. Any differences between the estimated amounts and actual final allocations are recorded in the following years. For the years ended 2019 and 2018, the allocations were recorded as follows:

Group Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Cooperative's headquarters facility is located in Socorro, New Mexico. The service area includes members located in several counties surrounding the City of Socorro. The Cooperative records a receivable for electric revenues as billed on a monthly basis.

The Cooperative requires a deposit from its members upon connection, which is applied to unpaid bills and fees in the event of default. The deposit accrues interest annually and is returned along with accrued interest with an established history of current payment or when the service is disconnected. As of December 31, 2019 and 2018, deposits on hand totaled \$293,927 and \$195,370, respectively.

The financial institutions in which the Cooperative had deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. At times during the year, the Cooperative's deposits exceeded the insured amounts.

Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2018 financial statement balances to conform to the 2019 presentation.

During the year ended December 31, 2013, the Cooperative refinanced \$8,951,955 of CFC debt with CoBank. This early payment resulted in fees amounting to \$1,709,476. These fees are being amortized to interest expense on long-term debt over 135 months, which approximates the anticipated repayment period of the new refinancing debt.

In May 2013, the Cooperative elected to participate in the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Retirement Security Plan (RS Plan) Prepayment. The Cooperative's original contribution was \$711,475 and is being amortized over ten years. Amortization expense for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$71,148.

8. Return of Capital

Under the provisions of the mortgage agreements, until the equities and margins equal or exceed 30.00% of the total assets of the Cooperative, the return to patrons of capital contributed by them is limited generally to 25.00% of the patronage capital or margins received by the Cooperative in the prior calendar year. The equities and margins of the Cooperative represent 38.46% of the total assets at December 31, 2019 excluding the accumulated other comprehensive income and 38.49% including the accumulated other comprehensive income. Capital credits totaling \$75,375 and \$411,491 were retired for 2019 and 2018, and were within guidelines set by RUS for return of capital.

14. Short-Term Borrowing

The Cooperative has a line of credit for short-term, variable rate financing from National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation (CFC) in the amount of \$4,700,000. There was \$1,050,000 and \$1,000,000 outstanding on this line of credit as of December 31, 2019 and 2018. The interest rate as of December 31, 2019 and 2018 was 3.25% and 3.75%, respectively.

The Cooperative also has a \$4,000,000 line of credit with CoBank at an interest rate of 3.34% for the year ended December 31, 2019 with a maturity date of July 31, 2020. As of December 31, 2019 and 2018, \$800,000 and \$1,000,000 were outstanding on this line of credit, respectively.

Both line of credit amounts are presented on the balance sheet as long-term debt since both outstanding amounts will be refinanced with FFB once the new loan fund request is approved.

16. Pension Plan

Defined Benefit Plan

The NRECA RS Plan is a defined benefit pension plan qualified under Section 401 and tax-exempt under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. It is a multiemployer plan under the accounting standards. The RS Plan sponsor's Employer Identification Number is 53-0116145 and the RS Plan Number is 333.

A unique characteristic of a multiemployer plan compared to a single employer plan is that all plan assets are available to pay benefits of any plan participant. Separate asset accounts are not maintained for participating employers. This means that assets contributed by one employer may be used to provide benefits to employees of other participating employers.

The Cooperative contributions to the RS Plan in 2019 and 2018 represented less than five percent of the total contributions made to the RS Plan by all participating employers. Socorro made contributions to the RS Plan of \$241,574 in 2019 and \$257,793 in 2018. Pension expense for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, including amortization was \$312,722 and \$328,941, respectively.

In the RS Plan, a "zone status" determination is not required, and therefore not determined, under the Pension Protection Act (PPA) of 2006. In addition, the accumulated benefit obligations and plan assets are not determined or allocated separately by individual employers. In total, the RS Plan was over 80% funded on January 1, 2019 and 2018 based on the PPA funding target and PPA actuarial value of assets on those dates.

Because the provisions of the PPA do not apply to the RS Plan, funding improvement plans and surcharges are not applicable. Future contribution requirements are determined each year as part of the actuarial valuation of the plan and may change as a result of plan experience.

Defined Contribution Plan

The employees also participate in a 401(k) plan, a defined contribution plan provided through National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. The Cooperative makes monthly contributions to the plan. The cost for the Cooperative was \$138,227 and \$138,694 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

17. Post-Retirement Benefits

The Cooperative provides post-retirement medical and life insurance premium coverage for eligible employees and trustees.

A summary of the plan follows:

Covered Group Current retirees limited to \$6,000 per year, active employees and

trustees with varying levels of Cooperative and participant provided

Life Insurance Benefits – Group Term Life Insurance Premiums

Eligibility, covered group, and period of coverage similar to medical benefits, but insurance, in effect, begins to be reduced starting at age 70.

Economic Assumptions

The discount rate used to develop the accumulated Post-Retirement Benefit Obligation was 3.1%. The assumed health care cost trend rate was 6.8% for 2019, declining to an ultimate level of 5.0% by 2026.

Management of the Cooperative intends to fund the plan as health care claims are required to be paid. Benefits are paid on behalf of retirees and are a function of medical insurance costs and number of retirees. Benefits paid for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 were \$13,743 and \$16,914, respectively.

This information is based on the most recent actuarial valuation calculated as of January 1, 2019.

18. Litigation and Commitments

There is no pending or threatened litigation at December 31, 2019 that would materially affect the Cooperative's financial condition.

19. Related Party Transactions

The Cooperative purchases all of its power from Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association (Tri-State), Inc. As a member of Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, Inc., the Cooperative has representation on the Board of Trustees. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, the Cooperative had investments in Tri-State of \$10,243,637 and \$9,682,734, and owed Tri-State \$1,301,780 and \$1,309,697 for purchased power, respectively.

20. Subsequent Events

The Cooperative has evaluated subsequent events through March 27, 2020, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

In December 2019, an outbreak of a novel strain of coronavirus (COVID-19) originated in Wuhan, China and has since spread to other countries, including the U.S. On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic. In addition, multiple jurisdictions in the U.S. have declared states of emergency. It is anticipated that these impacts will continue for some time. There has been no material financial impact to the Cooperative's operations to date. Future potential impacts include disruptions or restrictions on our employees' ability to work, reduced consumer demand for energy, and customers' ability to pay their monthly bills in a timely fashion. Changes to our operating environment may also be impacted. These changes may impact operating costs and net income. The future effects of these issues are unknown.

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In February 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update 2016-02, *Leases*. The new standard establishes a right-of-use (ROU) model that requires a lessee to record a ROU asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet for all leases with terms longer than 12 months. Leases will be clarified as either finance or operating, with classification affecting the pattern of expense recognition in the income statement. A modified retrospective transition approach is required for lessees for capital and operating leases existing at, or entered into after, the beginning of the earliest comparative period presented in the financial statements. We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Socorro Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the Cooperative), which comprise the balance sheet as of December 31, 2019, and the related statements of income, comprehensive income and patronage capital, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 27, 2020. In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 27, 2020, on our consideration of the Cooperative's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. No reports other than the reports referred to above have been furnished to management.

In connection with our audit, nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that the Cooperative failed to comply with the terms, covenants, provisions, or conditions of their loan, grant, and security instruments as set forth in 7 CFR Part 1773, *Policy on Audits of Rural Utilities Service Borrowers and Grantees*, insofar as they relate to accounting matters as enumerated below. However, our audit was not directed primarily toward obtaining knowledge of noncompliance. Accordingly, had we performed additional procedures, other matters may have come to our attention regarding the Cooperative's noncompliance with the above-referenced terms, covenants, provisions, or conditions of the contractual agreements and regulatory requirements, insofar as they relate to accounting matters. In connection with our audit, we noted no matters regarding the Cooperative's accounting and records to indicate that the Cooperative did not:

Maintain adequate and effective accounting procedures;

Utilize adequate and fair methods for accumulating and recording labor, material, and overhead costs, and the distribution of these costs to construction, retirement, and maintenance or other expense accounts;

Reconcile continuing property records to the controlling general ledger plant accounts;

Clear construction accounts and accrue depreciation on completed construction;

Record and properly price the retirement of plant;

Seek approval of the sale, lease or transfer capital assets and disposition of proceeds for the sale or lease of plant, material, or scrap;

Maintain adequate control over materials and supplies;

Prepare accurate and timely Financial and Operating Reports;

Obtain written RUS approval to enter into any contract for the management, operation, or maintenance of the borrower's system if the contract covers all or substantially all of the electric system;

Disclose material related party transactions in the financial statements, in accordance with requirements for related parties in generally accepted accounting principles;

Record depreciation in accordance with RUS requirements (See RUS Bulletin 183-1, Depreciation Rates and Procedures);

Comply with the requirements for the detailed schedule of deferred debits and deferred credits; and

Comply with the requirements for the detailed schedule of investments.

See note 4 and schedule 3 for the schedule of investments. See notes 7 and 15 for the schedule of deferred debits and deferred credits.

The purpose of this report is solely to communicate, in connection with the audit of the financial statements, on compliance with aspects of contractual agreements and the regulatory requirements for electric borrowers based on the requirements of 7 CFR Part 1773, *Policy on Audits of Rural Utilities Service Borrowers and Grantees.* Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.



NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Socorro Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the Cooperative) is a non-profit company organized to provide electric service at the retail level to primarily residential and commercial accounts in a designated service area composed of the counties surrounding the City of Socorro, New Mexico. Power delivered at retail is purchased wholesale from Tri-State Electric Generation and Transmission Association, Inc. Any revenues earned in excess of costs incurred are allocated to members of the Cooperative and are reflected as patronage capital equity in the balance sheet.

System of Accounts

The accounting records of the Cooperative are maintained in accordance with the Rural Utilities Service (RUS) Uniform System of Accounts (USOA) prescribed for RUS electric borrowers.

Electric Plant, Maintenance, and Depreciation

Electric plant is stated at the original cost of construction, which includes the cost of contracted services, direct labor, materials, and overhead items. Contributions from others toward the construction of electric plant are credited to the applicable plant accounts.

When property which represents a retirement unit is replaced or removed, the average cost of such property as determined from the continuing property records is credited to electric plant and such cost, together with cost of removal less salvage, is charged to accumulated provision for depreciation.

Maintenance and repairs, including the renewal of minor items of plant not comprising a retirement unit, are charged to the appropriate maintenance accounts, except that repairs of transportation and service equipment are charged to clearing accounts and redistributed to operating expense and other accounts.

Accounts Receivable

In the normal course of business, the Cooperative recognizes accounts receivable for energy delivered and billed. The Cooperative allows 20 days from the date of the bill for payment to be received or the service is considered delinquent. Delinquent accounts receive a penalty of .0667%. If no payment is received within 24 days the account is subject to disconnect.

The Cooperative provides an allowance for doubtful accounts to recognize the portion of receivables considered uncollectible. The Cooperative accrues for this allowance, as needed, in order to keep the allowance above the total amounts owed in excess of 90 days per the accounts receivable aging report. The Board of Trustees reviews delinquent accounts annually and charges off accounts over five years old.

Inventories

Materials and supplies inventories are valued at average unit cost.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are represented by cashgeneral and cash-restricted.

Cash - Restricted

The Cooperative holds cash that is restricted for scholarships.

Electric Revenues from Contracts with Customers

The Cooperative's operating revenues are under the jurisdiction of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission.

Substantially all operating revenues and customer accounts receivables are derived from contracts with customers. Performance obligations related to the sale of energy are satisfied as energy is delivered to customers. The Cooperative recognizes revenue that corresponds to the price of the energy delivered to the customer. The measurement of energy sales to customers is generally based on the reading of their meters, which occurs on a systematic basis throughout the month. At the end of each month, amounts of energy delivered to customers since the date of the last meter reading are estimated, and the corresponding unbilled revenue is recognized. The Cooperative has calculated that its unbilled revenue for delivered power usage which has not been billed to customers at December 31, 2020 and 2019 amounted to \$603,340 and \$530,217, respectively.

The Cooperative does not recognize a separate financing component of its collections from customers as contract terms are short-term in nature. The Cooperative presents its revenues net of any excise or sales taxes or fees.

The Cooperative's tariffs for electric service include a power cost recovery factor and a debt cost adjustment factor. These factors provide for the adjustment of electric rates charged to customers to reflect the changes in the cost of power and in interest costs, from the costs which were established in the test year of the Cooperative's last rate case. In order to match power costs and interest costs and related revenues, costs to be billed in subsequent periods are recognized as accrued under-collected power cost and debt cost adjustments, and amounts to be refunded to customers in subsequent periods are recognized as over-collected power cost and debt cost adjustments.

Income Tax Status

The Cooperative is an exempt organization for federal income tax purposes under Section 501(c)(12) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Cooperative has adopted the "uncertain tax positions" provisions of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The primary tax position of the Cooperative is its filing status as a tax exempt entity. The Cooperative determined that it is more likely than not that its tax positions will be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and that all tax benefits are likely to be realized upon settlement with taxing authorities.

The Cooperative files its income tax return in the U.S. federal jurisdiction. The Cooperative is no longer subject to U.S. federal tax examinations by federal taxing authorities for years before 2017.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Cooperative recognizes interest accrued related to income tax activities in interest expense and penalties in operating expenses. There were no penalties or interest recognized during the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019.

Patronage Capital Certificates

Patronage capital from associated companies is recorded at the stated amount of the certificates.

Group Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Cooperative's headquarters facility is located in Socorro, New Mexico. The service area includes members located in several counties surrounding the City of Socorro. The Cooperative records a receivable for electric revenues as billed on a monthly basis.

The Cooperative requires a deposit from its members upon connection, which is applied to unpaid bills and fees in the event of default. The deposit accrues interest annually and is returned along with accrued interest with an established history of current payment or when the service is disconnected. As of December 31, 2020 and 2019, deposits on hand totaled \$327,806 and \$293,927, respectively.

The financial institutions in which the Cooperative had deposits are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. At times during the year, the Cooperative's deposits exceeded the insured amounts.

Investments in Marketable Securities

In January 2016, FASB ASU 2016-01, Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities, Topic 321 (ASC 321). The Cooperative implemented the guidance on January 1, 2020. Results and disclosures for reporting periods beginning after December 31, 2019 are presented in accordance with ASC 321, while prior period results have not been adjusted and continue to be reported in accordance with prior accounting guidance.

ASC 321 eliminates the distinction between trading and available-for-sale equity securities. Beginning in 2020 these securities are valued at fair value with unrealized gains or losses recognized in net income. Prior amounts that were reported in accumulated other comprehensive income are presented as a cumulative effect of the adoption of ASC 321 and will be reported as other equities at the consolidated level.

Investment levels are based on inputs used to calculate fair market value of investments. Those inputs are defined for each level as follows:

- <u>Level 1</u> inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Cooperative has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- <u>Level 2</u> inputs are other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.
- <u>Level 3</u> inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2019 financial statement balances to conform to the 2020 presentation.

2. Assets Pledged

All assets of the Cooperative are pledged as security for the long-term debt to Rural Utilities Service (RUS), Federal Financing Bank (FFB), and CoBank.

The Cooperative is recovering the merger cost and interest from the Cooperative's members through electric rates as approved by the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission.

During the year ended December 31, 2013, the Cooperative refinanced \$8,951,955 of CFC debt with CoBank. This early payment resulted in fees amounting to \$1,709,476. These fees are being amortized to interest expense on long-term debt over 135 months, which approximates the anticipated repayment period of the new refinancing debt.

In May 2013, the Cooperative elected to participate in the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Retirement Security Plan (RS Plan) Prepayment. The Cooperative's original contribution was \$711,475 and is being amortized over ten years. Amortization expense for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 was \$71,148.

9. Return of Capital

Under the provisions of the mortgage agreements, until the equities and margins equal or exceed 30.00% of the total assets of the Cooperative, the return to patrons of capital contributed by them is limited generally to 25.00% of the patronage capital or margins received by the Cooperative in the prior calendar year. The equities and margins of the Cooperative represent 38.86% of the total assets at December 31, 2020 excluding the accumulated other comprehensive income and 38.94% including the accumulated other comprehensive income. Capital credits totaling \$381,879 and \$75,375 were retired for 2020 and 2019, and were within guidelines set by RUS for return of capital.

15. Short-Term Borrowing

The Cooperative has a line of credit for short-term, variable rate financing from National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation (CFC) in the amount of \$4,700,000. There was \$0 and \$1,050,000 outstanding on this line of credit as of December 31, 2020 and 2019. The interest rate as of December 31, 2020 and 2019 was 2.45% and 3.25%, respectively.

17. Pension Plan

Defined Benefit Plan

The NRECA RS Plan is a defined benefit pension plan qualified under Section 401 and tax-exempt under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. It is a multiemployer plan under the accounting standards. The RS Plan sponsor's Employer Identification Number is 53-0116145 and the RS Plan Number is 333.

A unique characteristic of a multiemployer plan compared to a single employer plan is that all plan assets are available to pay benefits of any plan participant. Separate asset accounts are not maintained for participating employers. This means that assets contributed by one employer may be used to provide benefits to employees of other participating employers.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Cooperative contributions to the RS Plan in 2020 and 2019 represented less than five percent of the total contributions made to the RS Plan by all participating employers. Socorro made contributions to the RS Plan of \$261,388 in 2020 and \$241,574 in 2019. Pension expense for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, including amortization was \$332,535 and \$312,722, respectively.

In the RS Plan, a "zone status" determination is not required, and therefore not determined, under the Pension Protection Act (PPA) of 2006. In addition, the accumulated benefit obligations and plan assets are not determined or allocated separately by individual employers. In total, the RS Plan was over 80% funded on January 1, 2021 and 2020 based on the PPA funding target and PPA actuarial value of assets on those dates.

Because the provisions of the PPA do not apply to the RS Plan, funding improvement plans and surcharges are not applicable. Future contribution requirements are determined each year as part of the actuarial valuation of the plan and may change as a result of plan experience.

Defined Contribution Plan

The employees also participate in a 401(k) plan, a defined contribution plan provided through National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. The Cooperative makes monthly contributions to the plan. The cost for the Cooperative was \$138,548 and \$138,227 for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, respectively.

18. Post-Retirement Benefits

The Cooperative provides post-retirement medical and life insurance premium coverage for eligible employees and trustees.

A summary of the plan follows:

Medical Benefits – Health Insurance Premiums

Eligible employees who have reached age 55 with 20 years of service.

Covered Group Current retirees limited to \$6,000 per year, active employees and

trustees with varying levels of Cooperative and participant provided

premiums based on age and years of service.

Type of Plan Point of Service Plan.

Life Insurance Benefits – Group Term Life Insurance Premiums

Eligibility, covered group, and period of coverage similar to medical benefits, but insurance, in effect, begins to be reduced starting at age 70.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Economic Assumptions

The discount rate used to develop the accumulated Post-Retirement Benefit Obligation was 2.65%. The assumed health care cost trend rate was 6.65% for 2020, declining to an ultimate level of 5.0% by 2027.

Management of the Cooperative intends to fund the plan as health care claims are required to be paid. Benefits are paid on behalf of retirees and are a function of medical insurance costs and number of retirees. Benefits paid for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019 were \$6,839 and \$13,743, respectively.

This information is based on the most recent actuarial valuation calculated as of January 1, 2020.

20. Related Party Transactions

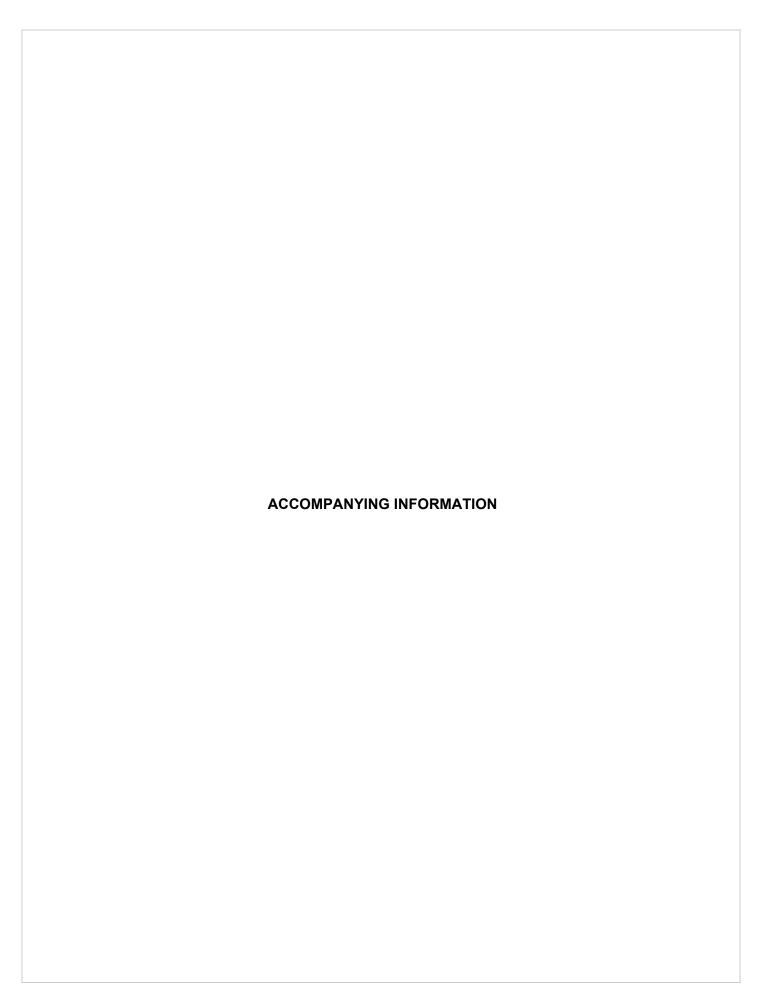
The Cooperative purchases all of its power from Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association (Tri-State), Inc. As a member of Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, Inc., the Cooperative has representation on the Board of Trustees. At December 31, 2020 and 2019, the Cooperative had investments in Tri-State of \$10,574,247 and \$10,243,637, and owed Tri-State \$1,354,600 and \$1,301,780 for purchased power, respectively.

The Cooperative has evaluated subsequent events through March 31, 2021, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

22. Recently Issued Accounting Pronouncement

In February 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update 2016-02, *Leases*. The new standard establishes a right-of-use (ROU) model that requires a lessee to record a ROU asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet for all leases with terms longer than 12 months. Leases will be clarified as either finance or operating, with classification affecting the pattern of expense recognition in the income statement. A modified retrospective transition approach is required for lessees for capital and operating leases existing at, or entered into after, the beginning of the earliest comparative period presented in the financial statements. The new standard is effective for nonpublic entities for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021. The Cooperative is evaluating the impact of the new standard on the financial statements.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Socorro Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the Cooperative), which comprise the balance sheet as of December 31, 2020, and the related statements of income, comprehensive income and patronage capital, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 31, 2021. In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 31, 2021, on our consideration of the Cooperative's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. No reports other than the reports referred to above have been furnished to management.

In connection with our audit, nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that the Cooperative failed to comply with the terms, covenants, provisions, or conditions of their loan, grant, and security instruments as set forth in 7 CFR Part 1773, *Policy on Audits of Rural Utilities Service Borrowers and Grantees*, insofar as they relate to accounting matters as enumerated below. However, our audit was not directed primarily toward obtaining knowledge of noncompliance. Accordingly, had we performed additional procedures, other matters may have come to our attention regarding the Cooperative's noncompliance with the above-referenced terms, covenants, provisions, or conditions of the contractual agreements and regulatory requirements, insofar as they relate to accounting matters. In connection with our audit, we noted no matters regarding the Cooperative's accounting and records to indicate that the Cooperative did not:

Maintain adequate and effective accounting procedures;

Utilize adequate and fair methods for accumulating and recording labor, material, and overhead costs, and the distribution of these costs to construction, retirement, and maintenance or other expense accounts;

Reconcile continuing property records to the controlling general ledger plant accounts;

Clear construction accounts and accrue depreciation on completed construction;

Record and properly price the retirement of plant;

Seek approval of the sale, lease or transfer capital assets and disposition of proceeds for the sale or lease of plant, material, or scrap;

Maintain adequate control over materials and supplies;

Prepare accurate and timely Financial and Operating Reports;

Obtain written RUS approval to enter into any contract for the management, operation, or maintenance of the borrower's system if the contract covers all or substantially all of the electric system;

Disclose material related party transactions in the financial statements, in accordance with requirements for related parties in generally accepted accounting principles;

Record depreciation in accordance with RUS requirements (See RUS Bulletin 183-1, Depreciation Rates and Procedures);

Comply with the requirements for the detailed schedule of deferred debits and deferred credits; and

Comply with the requirements for the detailed schedule of investments.

See Note 4 and Schedule 3 for the schedule of investments. See Notes 8 and 16 for the schedule of deferred debits and deferred credits.

The purpose of this report is solely to communicate, in connection with the audit of the financial statements, on compliance with aspects of contractual agreements and the regulatory requirements for electric borrowers based on the requirements of 7 CFR Part 1773, *Policy on Audits of Rural Utilities Service Borrowers and Grantees*. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.
